## How to Run a Speech-A-Thon (modified 6-27-14)

## A#1 Designate the speech-a-thon chair

This person will be in charge of delegating tasks and overseeing all areas to put on a successful event. Suggested tasks to delegate might be food, recruiting speakers, functionaries, and venue. Checklist;

- a) Find a suitable venue, date, and time (after work, weekends, in place of a regular meeting)
  - a. Our traditional IMM East conference room (if on a Saturday, the front doors are locked)
  - b. DNC East conference room (doors also locked)
  - c. Someone's home
  - d. Park, beach, other public gathering place
  - e. Need to bring items from the cabinet or arrange to have a key
- b) Arrange for food
  - a. Delegate a Food Chair and determine a budget
  - b. Potluck
  - c. Pizza (pickup or delivery?)
  - d. Breakfast vs. Lunch vs. Happy Hour vs. Dinner items
- c) Recruit speakers
  - a. Announce at the club and by e-mail
  - b. Delegate a Speaker Chair to sign people up, get their speech titles, goals, and timing
  - c. Able to have longer advanced speeches that could be 15-20 minutes long
  - d. Decide if there are enough speakers to hold multiple sessions (suggest no more than 6 speeches per session, so people can pay attention, then get up and move around)
- d) Recruit Toastmaster
  - a. Decide if there will be multiple sessions and multiple Toastmasters
- e) Recruit functionaries
  - a. Each speaker can also be a speech evaluator
  - b. Timer is required
  - c. Could skip the grammarian and general evaluator roles; Ah/Uh counter is useful.
  - d. Table Topics are optional, if you want to complete more speeches
  - e. Videographer is optional, but useful

In the past, we have held these events in conjunction with another club. This gave us a chance to see new speakers and to have different evaluations.

It's useful to hold these events in June, when clubs are striving to meet DCP goals. However, having one speech-a-thon a quarter is very useful as well.

Once, we had three sessions of 6 speakers (18 total) in one day, but people only attended their particular session. Most of the club members were able to present a speech on that one day. In between sessions, we had team-building games or lunch with Table Topics, so that participants of two sessions could interact with each other, before the first session's participants left.
